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CASE 03

A seven-year-old boy found his way back to Sri Lanka from Bahrain after an unexpected, prolonged stay in the country. He came to Bahrain in the pursuit of a brighter future along with his parents in mid-2022 on a visit visa. However, he could not return as planned, and his stay got extended far beyond what was intended. Tragically, his father was compelled to return to Sri Lanka, having fallen victim to deceitful promises of employment that cost him financially. In this hour of need, the Migrant Workers Protection Society (MWPS) stepped in and dealt with the complexities of paperwork and permissions, ensuring the boy's safe passage home, all while working closely with the immigration authorities to waive any visa penalties.

The boy is united with his father in Sri Lanka, while his mother continues to work in Bahrain, providing for her family from afar.

BULLETIN

Bahrain's Shura Council is on the verge of implementing a landmark decision that could set a precedent in the recruitment of domestic workers. With a significant majority, the council members have signalled their approval for amendments to the Labour Market Regulatory Law, which may introduce a cap on recruitment costs. The decision comes after a second round of voting, overcoming initial concerns about the amendment's completeness. The proposed changes, spearheaded by five council members, aim to regulate the fees charged by manpower agencies, ensuring they adhere to a maximum rate set by the Labour Market Regulatory Authority (LMRA), with the flexibility to offer discounts but not exceed the established cap.

LMRA's CEO, Nibras Talib, has requested additional time to finalise solutions in collaboration with the Foreign Ministry and other relevant entities. He emphasised that recruitment costs are determined by various factors, including the worker's personal attributes and additional expenses such as travel and agency fees.

The move towards capping fees aligns with regional trends, as neighbouring countries have already implemented similar measures, resulting in more standardised and often reduced costs for hiring domestic workers from various nationalities.

CASE 01

In a challenging turn of events, a seaman from India faced a series of hardships during his time in Bahrain. Despite holding a valid work permit, his employer failed to pay his salary for three months due to insufficient catch and demanded that he pay the visa fee of BD228 and leave the country. Seeking assistance, he approached the concerned authorities, but to no avail, as his employer remained unresponsive.

Amidst this ordeal, his father fell critically ill and passed away, which led to his employer finally returning his passport and partially settling his dues (BD85). However, without the means to return home, the man found himself in dire straits. It was then that the Migrant Workers Protection Society (MWPS) stepped in, providing not only essential supplies and financial aid for his transportation (a financial subsidy of BD50 to cover his local transportation costs and return airfare) but also support in navigating the bureaucratic processes. Thanks to the intervention, the expat worker was able to return to India, departing on March 25.

CASE 02

A nurse assistant from Cameroon, faced a harrowing ordeal while working in Bahrain. After suffering mistreatment from her employer, she was hospitalised, her condition so severe that she fell into a coma. During this critical time, the Migrant Workers Protection Society (MWPS) stepped in. MWPS members visited her in the hospital, advocating tirelessly on her behalf to secure the release of her passport from her employer. Thanks to the intervention of MWPS and her indomitable spirit, she made a full recovery. With her passport finally in hand, MWPS continued to aid, handling the necessary formalities to ensure her safe return to her home country.
